59TH CONVENTION AND ANNUAL MEETING PLANS

The NDTOA 2025 Convention will be held at the Ramada, 1400 Interchange Avenue, Bismarck ND, on December 8th and 9th. Speakers invited include Governor Armstrong, NDDOT Director Ron Henke to speak about the Flex Fund grants, State Treasurer Tom Beadle will speak about the Flex Fund and Prairie Dog payment timeline and qualifications for the payments; Justin Messner and Brent Kahl will present on FEMA-NDDES applications and procedures, Tyler Spomer will present on FEMA requirements for the National Flood Insurance Program, and there are still more being lined up. Representatives from NDDOT will be there to answer all your questions about the transportation grant programs. The issues of the budget hearing requirement and levy caps will also be addressed.

Vice President Todd Weber will lead a discussion about a proposal

to make some fundamental changes to the association. If fully implemented the board of directors would be increased from 6 to 9 districts and the president and vice president would be selected from the board members by the board. There is a provision that the selected officers would be ratified by the membership at the annual meeting. If there is a consensus that supports this proposal it would be presented to the 2026 annual meeting as a constitutional and bylaws amendment. If you want to have input on this proposal it is imperative that you attend this meeting.

When the presentations and times are finalized, the agenda will be posted on the website at NDTOA. COM. While you are on the website check out all the features and resources.

On Monday afternoon the annual

business meeting will see elections of the President, Vice President and three Directors. The President and Vice President are not eligible for re–election.

The registration fee for this convention remains unchanged from last year, \$40 per officer attending if pre-registered by November 29. The charge at the door also remains the same as last year at \$60 per officer. Pre-registration really helps us plan for and contract meals, so please take a minute and fill out and submit the registration form which can be found in this newsletter or online NDTOA.COM.

The meeting will be streamed live on Zoom but there will not be any way for virtual involvement in the meeting. If you want to participate, you will need to attend the meeting in person. Check out NDTOA.COM for the Zoom link and updates on the convention program.

The DOT Flex Fund Team has been reviewing the applications and has pre-ranked them, now the Flex Fund Committee will begin meeting in early November to further score the merits of each application before the list goes to the NDDOT Director for final approval.

Obviously with \$108 million of township requests for \$31.1 million of grants, less than 1 out of 3 will be successful in this round. Those successful will be notified early next year. Those that are not successful should not give up but should seek to improve their applications for the next round. Ask what you could do better; this is important because competitive grant funding is likely here to stay. If your township needs money to fix something, you need to apply, and your application will need to show greater need than the next two applications to win. But the applications that beat yours out this time will not be on the list next time so there might be a chance in a future round!

North Dakota is Changing

Hello Township Officers! I'm excited for the opportunity to be a part of the North Dakota Township Officers Association. I grew up in Griggs County and have been involved in my family farm for as long as I can remember. I've spent the last twelve years as the State's Attorney in both Nelson and Griggs County and am the past president of the NDACo. I am now farming full-time, working for NDTOA and Griggs County. I am excited to assist the NDTOA and the member townships in anyway possible.

I'm staring out my office window this morning, watching it rain and wondering when we will finish harvest. I hope we can get back into some dry warmer weather so everyone can finish their beans and corn before we settle into winter. I know there are some of you who have had a dry harvest and others who have had plenty of moisture that may have you dealing with mud in the fields and on the roads. On that note, take some time to do a road and sign survey when you're checking out any last-minute road repairs that need to be completed this year. Make sure to document this for your records.

As a kid I can remember my parents telling me that things weren't like they were when they were growing up. Now that I'm about the age they were when they

gave me their wisdom, I'm going to tell you the same. THINGS AREN'T HOW THEY USED TO BE.

Times have definitely changed, we are now staring down the barrel of companies developing data centers, carbon pipelines, wind towers, and solar panels. North Dakota seems to be on the developers' radar for development with many sites under construction and more being developed every day. If your township is concerned about the proximity of these new developments to your farms or homes I would encourage you to take a look at your zoning ordinances and update them accordingly. Though you can not implicitly or explicitly prohibit development, zoning should help promote the health and safety of your townships.

NDTOA's state conference is scheduled for December 8 and 9 at the Ramada in Bismarck. We're planning on an interesting agenda, with some good presenters and speakers. Please plan to attend the conference. Expenses for attending should be paid by your township, and I promise you will all learn something that will benefit your township. You will also have an opportunity to vote for your State Officers and approve the NDTOA's annual budget.

I hope to see you all at the

conference in December! Tom Moe is a hard act to follow and I have some big shoes to fill, but I hope to answer some of the common questions I receive just as Tom did.

Q: Does the city have the ability to enforce zoning regulations against individuals outside of the city limits, but within a mile of a city?

A: Yes, may by ordinance extend it zoning regulations to land outside city limits to any quarter section of land if the majority of that quarter section is located within the extraterritorial jurisdiction of the city. That distance is determined by the size of the city; it is 1 mile if the population is fewer than 5,000, 2 miles if the population is greater than 5,000 but less than 25,000, and it is 4 miles if the population is great than 25,000. NDCC 40–47–01.1

Q: We have a resident whose cattle are continually getting out and a few have been hit before. This resident doesn't believe that he is responsible for the boarder fences even if the neighbor doesn't have cattle.

A: Bottom line is the owner of the cattle is responsible for his cattle. A person who fails to maintain fences and allows their cattle to run at large may be charged with a B misdemeanor criminal offense. NDCC 47-26-01 and NDCC 36-11-01.

The North Dakota Department of Transportation (NDDOT) is requesting your assistance to identify locations within your jurisdiction where rail/highway crossing safety could be improved. The information provided should contain the location of the grade crossing by street or road name and the distance and direction to the nearest town(s). Please be specific about your concern or suggestion for improvement.

NDDOT has annual federal funds available for safety enhancement projects at rail/highway at-grade crossings. These funds are used for the installation of active warning devices (e.g. flashing light signals with gates), crossing signs, and crossing surface improvements.

Please remit your concerns or suggestions before **December 31, 2025**, so they can be included in the annual review process. Be assured past concerns have been incorporated in the statewide pool of prioritized crossings.

Grassroots Government Leadership Award

SELECTING CRITERIA

Nomination should include as much information as possible, such as:

- Complexity of the problem(s) addressed.
- Measurable improvements resulting from nominee's accomplishments.
- Use of original, innovative or creative approaches and solutions in difficult situations.
- Long-term or lasting benefit of the nominee's accomplishments.



District Directorships to be filled this annual meeting are as follows: (All are eligible for re-election.)



At the time of election, a candidate to be an officer or director of NDTOA must be a currently elected township officer of a township that is a duespaying member of NDTOA.


